The post office treated us great. This was the sixth year that Al from the post office had attended the show.



Discover What's Online!

Starting in this issue I will be sharing with you Web sites on stamp collecting that I've found to be fun or interesting. Maybe you've read a lot about all sorts of sites that you can visit but have been hesitant to get online? Maybe you think all there is to find are online auctions? My goal is to share with you the exciting sites that I've found about the hobby and you don't have to be willing to buy anything to enjoy an online philately experience. Stamp collectors, just like you, use the Web to share their passion with the world.

Country Sites

Start your first experience on the Web by checking out your favorite country's postal office site. It is a great way to check out upcoming issues and read some interesting articles about stamp collecting. I've chosen a couple of my favorites picked for their content and design.

The **USPS** site is a very good site (<http://shop.usps.com>). I like looking at the illustrations of the new issues and you can learn about why the subject was chosen. The image of the Washington Monument on this page was taken from the site. The USPS site also has some good information about starting a stamp collection.



Canada

What I like about the Canadian site is that it has an entire section for young collectors called Kid Quest with games, puzzles and interesting articles for kids. This is a great place to get your children or grandchildren interested in the hobby. You can also order free stamp catalogs on this site. Many other countries offer free literature to people interested in collecting stamps.

Denmark

(<http://www.stamps.postdanmark.dk>) I've picked Denmark as an example of a country where the primary language is not English. However, that shouldn't stop you from looking for your favorite country. Many sites, like Denmark's offer their Web pages in English as well as Danish.

New Zealand (link too complex, check out the Sequoia site) is an interesting site because it features not only stamps from NZ but also is the distributor for a number of other Pacific Island countries such as Samoa, Pitcairn and Vanuatu.
