One of the best country Web sites for collectors is the New Zealand Post site at www.nzpost.co.nz/. There are plenty of pictures and background





information on current and past NZ issues. The site itself is very easy to navigate and ordering is easy — I've personally ordered on this site a number of times and received stamps within 10 days. The exchange rate also makes buying direct a good deal. NZ also serves as the distributor for a number of small South Pacific Island, including: Vanuatu, Tonga, Pitcairn, Samoa and Niue, as well as distributing stamps for the Ross Dependency and Hong Kong. If you collect South Pacific Island stamps — this is a great destination to visit.

New Issues



This year celebrates the centennial of the first flight of the Wright brothers in December of 2003. Many countries will be celebrating this tremendous technological breakthrough with commemorative issues.

Pictured here is the UN commemorative of that event. To commemorate the centenary of first flight, UNPA is issuing for the first time a têtebêche stamp in the denominations of 23 cents and 70 cents. A tête-bêche stamp is a pair of stamps connected together with one right side up, the other upside down. When the two stamps are combined, a full rotation of a propeller in motion can be seen. The tête-bêche stamp was designed by Robert Stein (United Nations).

Classic Stamps

Mauritius was the first British colony and the fifth country in the world to issue postage stamps . The definitive issues from 1860 onwards, notably the Queen's head and Arms types, are some of the rarest of stamps





in the world — only 26 pieces survive, 12 of 1 Penny cancelled and 2 mint, and 6 of Two Pence cancelled and 6 mint. The estimated value of each of these stamps is over 1 million US Dollar. http://www.stampsmauritius.com/ Stamps.htm

Did you know? — interesting facts, humor and stories from the world of stamps

The History of U.S. Postcards

The official figures from the U.S. Post Office for the fiscal year ending June 1908 showed that nearly 680 million postcards were mailed that year in the U.S.? That was at a time when the total population of the U.S. was only 89 million. While collecting postcards is still a popular hobby (deltiology), few realize how important they were at the beginning of the 20th Century. Before wide spread use of the telephone, the postcard was the most convenient way for people to quickly communicate with one another.

During the next couple of issues of the Chatter, we'll take a look at the development and use of postcards in U.S. postal history.

Pre-Postcard Era, Pre-1898

Due to government regulations concerning the use of privately printed cards in the mail, postcards, as we know them, were a long time in developing. The direct ancestor were envelopes printed with pictures on them. Envelopes printed with comics, Valentines and music were common themes. During the Civil War, *Patriotic Covers*, were extremely popular.

The first postal type card in this country was privately printed by J.P. Carlton and H.L. Lipman. The "Lipman Postal Card", as we now call them, had a blank front for writing messages and the back was inscribed with three lines-one with their patent mark, the other two for addressing and stamping. They advertised their product as a cheaper way to send rapid correspondence at half the price of paper. Lipman cards disappeared after 1873, when the U.S. government introduced Government Postals.



And finally.....



Because of patriotic fervor over the last year, demand for the flag coil issue has bypassed what stamps have been produced by the U.S. To meet the demand, *Stamp Collector* reported on April 21, 2003 that the Banknote Corp. of American has received an order to produce 10 million coil rolls of 100 of the .37 Flags. The one pictured here is the current design and it isn't known how the new version will differ when it is produced

Other stamps with patriotic themes have been planned already for 2003. In February, a .37 flag definitive in ATM pane of 18 was issued. On April 3, a prestige booklet of 20 .37 stamps (5 designs) was issued. This series depicts Uncle Sam, Fan, Election Ribbon, Star-Spangled Banner Sampler and Lady Liberty. (see page 7)
