

Election Results:

At the February 28th meeting, two important votes took place. The first vote was on the adoption of the revised club by-laws. In the previous Chatter, an insert was included with the details of the proposed changes. The major revision involved changes in the make up of the Executive Committee, providing for three Directors at Large elected directly by the membership. The motion to accept the changes to the by-laws was passed by a vote of 43-2.

After the favorable vote on the by-laws changes, a special election was held to select the three new members of the Governing Board. Six outstanding candidates gave short speeches as to why they should be elected, and then the voting took place by secret ballot.

It was a very close election, with only seven votes separating first and last place. The top vote getters were Ed Rodriguez, Gil Goodrich, and Kristin Patterson. Congratulations to our new Governing Board Members for 2012.

U.S. Stamps And America's Pride in Space Exploration By Marsha Brandsdorfer

At this time President Obama has put a halt on continuing the United States space program to save on funding as our country is in economic disaster. How does this affect stamp topical collectors and the American public? It could mean that there would probably be no more U.S. space stamps issued for a long time.

Recently I read an interesting non-fiction book published in 2007, entitled <u>Too Far From Home: A Story of Life and Death in Space</u> by Chris Jones. This book is an in-depth look at how dangerous, yet important, space travel is and the challenges needed to try and keep astronauts conditionally safe and psychologically sound while in space.

Jones wrote about astronauts Donald Pettit, Kenneth Bowersox and Nikolai Budarin, who "lost their ride home" from the International Space Station when the Columbia shuttle heading back to earth destructed on its descent killing seven astronauts aboard in 2003. After months of waiting, Pettit, Bowersox, and Budarin finally departed the International Space Station and they arrived safely home by way of a Russian capsule.

The author explained that often the American public is unexposed and, perhaps for the most part, uninterested in space travel until a tragedy such as what happened with the Columbia occurs.

To expose Americans to the celebration of space expedition, pride needs to be represented on U.S. Stamps as they were in the stamps below. More U.S. stamps need to be issued to commemorate our achievements and U.S. space explorations

need to be brought back.


Make a special effort to attend on May 8. Bio about Ed Burfine:
