July 10th, Old Germany

On July 10th, Virginia and Sig will do a presentation on the stamps of Old Germany. Germany had a turbulent history even before the World Wars – being made up of a loose alliance of many petty nation states who were often battling each other.

It wasn't until the mid-1800s that a united German Empire was formed under the Prussian leader Bismarck. In 1872, the first issues for the whole of Germany, excluding Bavaria and Wurttemberg, who still continued to issue their own stamps, were printed.

In 1874 the Postmaster of the German Empire, Heinrich von Stephan, became largely responsible for the establishment of the General Postal Union (Universal Postal Union from 1878). The German Empire was one of the first 22 signatories.

Philatelic Forgery Site

Here is an interesting site to check out this month on stamp forgery. A very simple site with not a lot of graphics and design to get in the way of the serious student of fake stamps. This site compares dozens of issues from around the world of classic stamps that have been conterfited. This site is done by a local stamp collector, Bill Claghorn.

Focus on a Classic

After his assassination in 1865, the portrait of Abraham Lincoln appeared in every new series of stamps until 1902. People became very upset, however, when he didn't appear with the new Washington/Franklin issue. Especially upset were those planning a special 100th anniversary of his birth in 1809.

By joint resolution the Senate and House encouraged the PMG Frank Hitchcock to design and issue a special commemorative stamp. Although

New Issues

In celebration of the British obsession with the weather and to commemorate the first sale of weather charts in 1851, Royal Mail has released a mini-sheet depicting four meteorological conditions often experienced in the UK.

Shown here is the 27p stamp. What is interesting about this stamp is that for the first time thermochromic ink is used on these stamps.

Hitchcock was not bound by this resolution he commissioned the stamp shown here (Scott #367). Being short on time designer Aubrey Huston used the existing .02 Washington-Franklin frame with the portrait of Lincoln in the center. Small changes were made to include dates in the ribbon but the design meant no new frame would be needed. The right-facing portrait of Lincoln was also a unique feature of this stamp. When you touch the purple cloud on or above the 27p, the heat from you hand will cause the ink to change color.

Exhibiting: Part of this newsletter is the prospectus and application for exhibiting at Penpex which can be returned to Vesma Grinfelds, our exhibit chairperson. Cachets: Miriam Thurston is developing cachets along with Leonard Holmsten to give you a good variety – suggested stamps for use this year include the new Veterans and famous baseball stadium issues.

Following are the biographies of the two above people so you can get to know them better.

Vesma Grinfelds:

Vesma is a native of San Francisco and started collecting stamps at the age of seven and was encouraged by her parents to continue as she grew. As a child she was a competitive ice skater. When she was 14 she took up the sport of bowling and became a professional bowler for almost 25 years with numerous titles -- a member of both the WIBC and Professional Hall of Fame.

She is a graduate of Lowell High School and the University of California Berkeley. Everyone in her family collects stamps: mother and son both exhibit stamps in the Baltic realm at every level. She is currently manages the family's real estate business.

Miriam Thurston:

Miriam was born in Brooklyn, New York during the depression years and lived there through WWII. Her father was a working artist who greatly influenced her as she was taught to draw by him as a youngster. When her parents died she moved to Palo Alto to be with her oldest brother. She graduated from Menlo/Atherton High School and became an apricot picker, however, she was accepted at the California School of Fine Arts. She became a Technical Illustrator and during the Vietnam War did secret illustrating.

She married and had twin daughters as well as a third daughter. When her beloved husband passed away, she went to work for Ampex and learned Computer Graphics. She took an interest in philately when her pastor entered an exhibit at a stamp show. She joined Sequoia Stamp Club in 1998, and has enjoyed learning about the hobby through special philatelic teaching programs and presentations. She now exhibits and collects ANYTHING from ANYWHERE!

In Memory of Herb Saylor

At the 2000 SACAPEX, Herb Saylor received, posthumously, the Chaloner Award. Herb was a member and past president of the Sunnyvale Stamp Society and SUNPEX chairman for several years.

He belonged to the San Jose Stamp Club, Fremont Stamp Club and the **Sequoia Stamp Club**. Herb also served as the Director-at-Large of the Western Philatelic Library, where he set up a microscopic digital camera system for use by anyone who needed this ability.

He developed expertise in classifying and photographing the plate flaws of the 1893 Columbian issue through use of the microphotography equipment. Herb was one of a kind. His enthusiasm for whatever he was interested in carried over to promotion of the hobby to young and old alike.

Herb is remembered for the generosity of his time, talents and expertise without expectation for payment.
