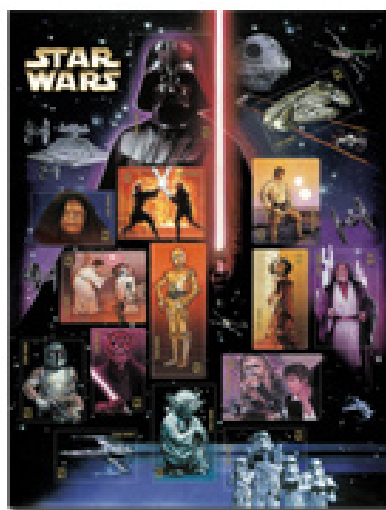

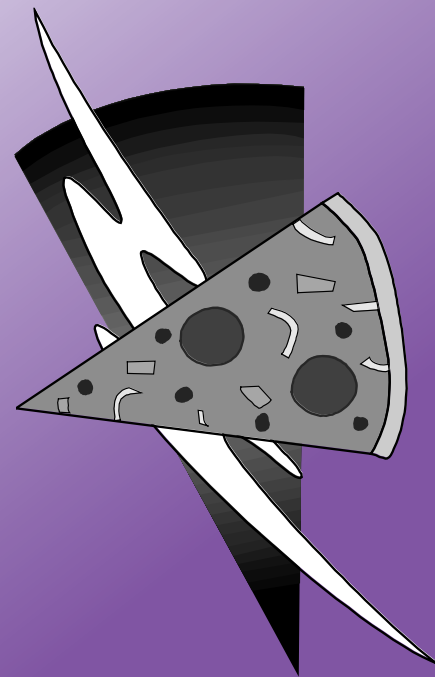

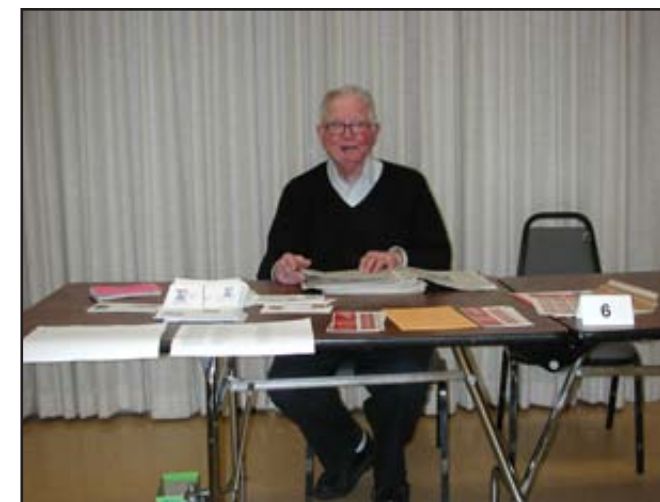
PENPEX 2007

Collecting Maps on Stamps

The irony is that I collect maps on stamps. I am not into geography and I have not done much traveling at all in the past decade. It isn't that I don't want to, but now that I'm getting older, any extra money needs to be put away for my retirement within the next two decades. So, I travel through books and stamps. I decided about three years ago to collect maps on stamps because like knowledge itself, the availability of maps on stamps is endless.

I collect United Stamps and International used and mint stamps but mostly I just choose them because they are pretty and I enjoy the designs. My main enjoyment is in the art of each individual stamp. There are simple designs and I have also added to my collection many stamps with fine details that are extraordinary.

I store my endless supply in mini stock books. Using my tongs I carefully place them behind the white sheets to protect them. The stock books sit securely on my bookcase. There is no particular order to the stock books or the stamps in them. However, some stamps do unintentionally become arranged in an organized manner. For instance, at the Sunnyvale Stamp Club, last year I purchased from a member of the group numerous Egyptian stamps (see figure1) with defined maps. Since I bought a handful at one time, you can flip through the pages of one of my stock books and see these Egyptian stamps arranged in an orderly fashion.

United Nations' stamps (see figure2) are also a popular addition to my collection because of the stamps' constant use of the globe. A globe is considered a map stamp because on the globe, we see land and water. Globes can be found on many space stamps as well. So my maps on stamps have a dual role in topical collection, as some of them also contribute to the theme of space stamps (see figure3). I have many space stamps in my collection, because of a piece of land or water appearing on the stamps.

Russia is a popular country for my collection because Russia has many maps on stamps as well as many space stamps. And there are many stamps in my collection of countries I hadn't heard of before I started my stamp collection. Again, I choose these stamps because they add color and uniqueness to my collection. I also enjoy treasure hunting for more stamps. The endless supply of maps on stamps makes my collection exciting for I never know what surprises I might find.
