#### First Man in Space

Yuri Alekseyevich Gagarin would ultimately be selected as the final candidate from a group of six front-runners called the Vanguard Six, to become the first cosmonaut to orbit the earth for the Soviets. He was twenty-six years old, married and just five foot five. His intelligence and devotion to the Communist Party was admirable, and he was not the type to panic if things failed. He had an infectious personality wherein he easily made friends.

The Soviets prepared for their manned flight with secrecy. Using dogs and then a human mannequin they named Ivan Ivanovich, they performed covert test flights. After much trial and error, finally when they had success, they wanted to launch Gagarin to space. But there were still fears that it may not succeed as there was no 100% guarantee of safety. Additionally, since no one knew what to expect with regards to how weightlessness in space would affect a human being, there were fears of a cosmonaut sustaining blindness, heart failure, or having difficulty with breathing or swallowing, and possibly even going insane. Gagarin and the others of Vanguard Six had undergone extensive training and stressful tests of endurance to prepare them for unknown conditions.

The Soviet flight was planned for a single orbit around the earth, with an expected landing place inside the USSR. The date of the flight was to be the morning of April 12, 1961, where the spacecraft Vostok would take off at the launch pad at Site 1 at the Tyuratam Cosmodrome.

During the early morning of April 12, Gagarin underwent a brief physical and was suited up and entered a bus to drive him to the launch pad. He was then helped into Vostok, lying back on an ejection seat with the hatch behind him. There was a TV camera pointing at his face to transmit live pictures back to the Soviet Union. There was a tape recorder for him to record his experiences. Gagarin was then successfully launched into orbit.

But still, there was suspense. Would he return safely? When Vostok was aligned for reentry, the braking engine fired. Its burn started to slow him down to take him out of orbit to begin his descent. As Vostok entered the atmosphere, great heat was burning off the asbestos shield. Gagarin would later say that he felt like he was trapped in a house on fire, and was able to smell the burning and hear the crackling sound. The capsule was shaking and rocking violently. Finally, close to earth, Gagarin ejected his seat from the capsule. His small stabilized parachute popped open to slow down his speed and stop him from spinning. As he came closer to landing, his main parachute opened and his seat automatically fell away from him. The Vostok capsule landed with its own parachute.



Gagarin landed safely in the middle of a ploughed field, which belonged to a collective farm in Russia, near the small towns of Smelovka and Uzmorie. Everything would be different for Gagarin now. The news of his arrival had spread quickly. Gagarin was now the most famous person in the

world. He had accomplished what no one had ever done

before him.

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#### **Cover of the Month**

This month's cover is from the New Hebrides. It is franked with three low-value stamps from the 1941 overprinted set of 12. It has a 28 OCT 41 Circular Date Stamp Port-Vila cancel and a bilingual "Passed by Censor" marking. It is addressed to a Monsieur Bayer in New York City.



The archipelago of the New Hebrides is situated about 1500 miles northeast of Sydney, Australia. The New Hebrides was a philatelicly fascinating territory, being neither a British nor a French colony. Instead, it was governed by the two powers jointly as a so-called condominium. The Condominium was established in 1906 as a result of an alliance between France and the United Kingdom. Under the Condominium there were three separate administrations – one French, one British, and one joint administration with the latter having jurisdiction over the postal service. However, in most postage catalogues, the British and the French stamps of the New Hebrides are listed separately, which obscures the interrelationship of the issues. The condominium lasted until 1980, when New Hebrides gained its independence as the Republic of Vanuatu.

In the early 1940s, world history arrived at the New Hebrides. The French administration made history by refusing to give allegiance to the superior colonial administration of New Caledonia (which was loyal to the regime of Vichy) and joining the "France libre" movement of General de Gaulle on July 22, 1940. The overprint "France Libre" was made in New Caledonia, which had joined the "France libre" movement shortly after the New Hebrides. Approximately 6000 French sets of 12 from the 1938.

gold currency definitive issue were overprinted and released in Port-Vila on April 15, 1941 and in Santo on April 19, 1941. A part of that was sent to General de Gaulle's headquarters in London and sold to collectors. There are examples of commercial use, but a great many covers bearing the overprint are of philatelic origin as is the one shown above.

#### Postcard Corner:

#### The Last of the United States Battleships

While on a vacation to the east coast in June 2022, I was able to fulfill a goal that I had made for myself many years ago. That goal was to see, board, and experience the last of the mighty ships that were, for years, the mainstay of the United States Navy.

The last of these mighty ships on my list was USS Wisconsin currently in Norfolk, Virginia as a museum ship. Wisconsin was the last of four Iowa class battleships built during World War II. She was preceded by USS *Missouri*, *New Jersey*, and *Iowa*.

As the United States entered into World War II, after Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor in Hawaii, the battleship was still the mainstay of strength among the navies of the world. This attack caused the destruction of USS Arizona and USS Oklahoma and caused severe damage to USS California, West Virginia, and Nevada. All of these damaged ships were eventually salvaged and returned to service.

USS *Utah*, a World War I dreadnaught battleship, was also sunk during the attack with the loss of 58 crewmen. Some attempts were made to salvage the old ship, but attempts were eventually abandoned.

The last four US Navy battleships began service in 1943 when USS *Iowa* and *New Jersey* were commissioned. These were followed by USS *Missouri* in 1943 and finally by USS *Wisconsin* in 1944.

My first opportunity to visit one of these magnificent ships was in 1967 when USS New Jersey was at the port of Long Beach, California on her way to Viet Nam. What a sight she was to see! She was docked adjacent to the recently retired SS Queen Mary which had just completed her final voyage to Long Beach; two massive ships forming kind of a V shape. New Jersey is currently a museum ship docked at Camden, New Jersey.

We visited USS Missouri during her stop in San Francisco during Fleet Week while she was still on active duty during the Viet Nam war. As a student of history, it was a thrill for me to see and be on board the ship where Japan finally gave up. *Missouri* is currently a museum ship docked at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii very near our first involvement in World War II, the USS Arizona and her memorial.

Living in the San Francisco Bay area, I always felt sad while driving around the Benicia, California There, just off the coast of the Carquinez Strait in Solano County, sat the magnificent USS *Iowa*. While many of her sister ships were at their various homes as museum ships, poor Iowa just sat after being rejected by several homes, including San Francisco. Finally, in 2012 Iowa was adopted and towed to the port of San Pedro in Los Angeles, California.

While being prepared for the tow to Los Angeles, *Iowa* was briefly at Richmond, California. It was there that I was able to clearly see and experience this mighty ship firsthand. She was the first of her class and has been visited by more Presidents than any other battleship, Franklin Roosevelt, Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush, Donald Trump, and Joseph Biden.




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#### The Last of the United States Battleships ... Continued

Finally, in June 2022, I was able to see and board the last of the U.S. battleships USS *Wisconsin*! *Wisconsin* served our Navy through September 30, 1991. After being decommissioned on July 1, 1948, she came back to service in the Korean War on March 3, 1951, and again on October 22, 1988, to take part in the Gulf War.

After being equipped with modern missiles and drone surveillance aircraft, USS *Wisconsin* along with USS *Missouri* were able to pinpoint target areas in occupied Kuwait. Using information from drone aircraft, and using their 16" guns, the two targeted and destroyed occupying Iraqi targets as far as 25 miles away. On September 30, 1991, *Wisconsin* was decommissioned for the final time.
